Introduction

Camp Latieze is a secluded mountain retreat. It has a vast diversity of users and uses. Those uses include education, introspection and entertainment. The Camp offers no supervision or counseling to these various groups. We expect all of our users to be fully responsible for their own members. This responsibility includes the day-to-day activities of their members as well as their safety and well being while visiting the Camp. Because our users might not be familiar with the Camp and the particular safety issues they may encounter while visiting the Camp, and because the Shasta County Board of Education has the utmost concern for the safety and protection of our users, we have issued this guide to assist them. Also, our staff is fully trained in this plan and all safety procedures. We ask that the leaders of each group visiting Camp Latieze read this guide and make themselves familiar with the location of all safety-related items at the camp. This guide includes suggestions to follow when various safety and emergency issues arise. This information should act as a guide and should not restrict the use of good judgment based on the situation at hand. A copy of this guide is posted in each cabin, as well as the main hall. Each copy includes a map of the grounds, and a map of the surrounding area. In order to meet the terms of our agreement, the group leader must do the following:

1. Ensure a person in charge is on site at all times.
2. Conduct an orientation regarding the details of this safety plan with all attendees to the camp either prior to or immediately following the group's arrival at the camp.
3. Ensure a health supervisor is on site at all times (see "Health Supervision", page 5).
4. Ensure a health history is on file at camp for all non-adult campers (see Health Supervision", page 5).
5. Ensure that all illnesses and injuries are logged in the camp's medical logbook (see "Health Supervision", page 5).
6. Ensure that all food borne illnesses and medically diagnosed infectious, contagious or communicable diseases are reported to the Shasta County Department of Public Health, (530) 225-3767.
7. Ensure that all medication is properly maintained (see "Health Supervision", page 5).
8. Ensure counselors are on site as required (see "General Supervision", page 6).
9. Ensure that emergency transport and food service staff are available as necessary (see "General Supervision", page 6).
10. Perform an emergency assembly within two hours of the group's arrival at the camp (see "Emergency Assembly", page 6).

Emergency Preparedness

An emergency can occur at any time with or without warning. It is important that the group leaders are prepared when and if an emergency occurs at the camp. By being prepared, they will act calmly and in an organized manner. Following are recommendations for groups visiting Camp Latieze to help them be prepared.

Person in Charge

It is required to have a designated person in charge or group leader at least 25 years of age who will be on the Camp Latieze site the entire time, or have several people who can take turns being available to act in this capacity. This person will assume overall direction of any emergency or safety situation. It is important that all those who are staying at the camp know whom this person is and how to get information to them. The person in charge may want to assign staff that will assist in any situation and carry out assigned tasks.

Health Supervision

Every group renting the facility must provide a full-time adult at the camp charged with health supervision (health supervisor). The minimum requirement for this individual is a certificate of training in the principles of first aid. We also require that a health history of each non-adult camper be completed and maintained at the camp by the health supervisor. This health history is to include immunizations, health history and necessary medications. (A sample health form is attached). Health cards for adults are suggested, but not required.

All camper medication brought to organized camps by minor campers or adults that are to be dispensed by the health supervisor (or designated adult camper) shall be in the original labeled container. It must be accompanied by specific written dispensing instructions from the parent, legal guardian or licensed medical doctor.

All camper medication must be stored in a locked container when unattended by the health supervisor (or designated adult camper). Camp personnel will make a locked cupboard in the first aid cabin available for this purpose.

The camp maintains a Medical Log Book. Each group's health supervisor (or designated adult camper) is responsible to complete the appropriate information in the logbook for any and all injuries and illnesses occurring during the camp. Camp personnel will make the logbook available upon your arrival.

The person in charge of each camp must report all occurrences of food borne illness and medically diagnosed infectious, contagious or communicable diseases immediately to the Shasta County Department of Public Health. Phone numbers are located on page 2.

Swimming Pool

To ensure the safety of all campers we require that an "Aquatic Supervisor" is present at all times the pool gate(s) are unlocked. An Aquatic Supervisor must be at least 18 years of age and possess an "American Red Cross Advanced Life Saving Certificate" (or equivalent). The certificate must be available upon request.

General Supervision

To ensure the safety of your younger attendees, we require that at all times there is at least one counselor who is a high school graduate or who is least 18 years of age for every ten campers under 16 years of age. These counselors must possess demonstrated competence to supervise safety of camp activities and must have training in first aid. Also for the safety of all campers it is required that emergency transport facilities, and food service personnel is available.

Cabin Rosters

It is recommended that the person in charge keep a record of all visitors to the camp and any special needs they may have. This roster is beneficial in various types of safety and emergency situations that may occur while the group is visiting the Camp. This roster should be broken down by the cabin (or camping) assignment. These should be updated as group members arrive or depart. Also, it could be helpful if each cabin member knew the names of their fellow cabin members. A sample cabin roster is available by contacting the camp coordinator.

Emergency Assembly

In the event of various safety and emergency situations, a group assembly might be warranted. It would be beneficial that all group members understand the importance of an emergency assembly and the sound of the emergency alarm. An emergency alarm is located in the pantry in the back of the kitchen area. It can be activated by pulling the lever. The key is used to deactivate the alarm. The alarm should be activated during an emergency or for the drill. A roll call should be done at this time to make sure that all members are present. The group leader will provide instructions to the group at this time. These instructions will either be based upon information they have received from the appropriate agency, or using their own judgment based on the situation at hand. The alarm is reset using the key that is located at the alarm.

Safety Item Inventory

Water System- The camp's main water supply is from a well. A tank, which is approximately 4 feet in diameter and 6 feet tall, is located in a shed across the driveway from the swimming pool. There are no fire hydrants on the site.

Emergency Assembly Alarm- The button to activate emergency assembly alarm is located inside the kitchen's pantry door in the back of the kitchen. Horns for this alarm are located on both ends of the dining hall. Remote hikers may not be able to hear this alarm. There is no other alarm system.

Fire Extinguishers- There is a total of seventeen fire extinguishers in the general camp area. Four are located in the main hall, one in the kitchen (appropriately rated), one in the staff/counselor's cabin and one in each of the other cabins. There is also an Ansul system over the stove on the kitchen.

Water Pump- A gasoline-powered water pump and hoses are located inside of the wooden pump box between the swimming pool area restrooms. This pump is available to pump water from the swimming pool in the event the fire is not contained by the fire extinguishers. Instructions for pump operation are located with the pump. Extra hose lengths are located in the hose box on the main camp walkway.

First Aid Kit- There are two first aid kits and a first aid location at Camp Latieze. Both of the first aid kits are located in the cupboard in the kitchen. These both have basic first aid supplies. One is to be kept in the kitchen; the other is available to be used while hiking. The "Nurses Cabin" has been designated as our first aid location (please see the map on page 15). It has a full array of first aid supplies and equipment. These supplies are kept in a locked cabinet. The group leader will be given a key and is responsible for safeguarding the contents.

Telephones- There is several phones located throughout the site. One is located in the kitchen storeroom, one in the staff cabin, one at the pool, and one at the main house. The number for the kitchen and staff cabin is 474-3210. The number for the pool and the main house is 474-3211. Even though all phones can be used in the event of an emergency, the pool phone should be reserved for that purpose. There is also a payphone located on the north side of the main hall.

Emergency Access- The main ground route to the camp area is through Manton, east on Rock Creek Road, turn left, going north on Ponderosa, turn right, going east on Woodcutters Way (see the location map on page 15 of this plan). There is also a cement helicopter landing pad located on top of the hill behind the swimming pool. The pad is well cleared, in good condition, and suitable for landing. The GPS coordinates of the landing pad are: **N40027.401, W121048.053, elevation 3001'**.

Swimming Pool- There is lifesaving equipment available at the pool area. There is a sign that says "No Lifeguard on Duty" which is posted throughout the pool's open periods. There is also a "Pool Rules" sign posted. Those rules must be obeyed at all times the pool is in use. *Safety Plan and Maps-* The Main hall, the kitchen and each of the cabins are supplied with a copy of this safety plan. The safety plan includes emergency guidelines, wildlife precautions and appropriate maps.

General Site Safety

Site Maintenance

The Shasta County Office of Education makes every attempt to maintain the camp in acceptable working order. Occasionally maintenance situations arise when staff attention is necessary. As a camp user, should a maintenance situation arise, we request that you first try reaching the caretaker at the numbers shown on page 2. If this is an emergency situation (water pump failure or major kitchen problem) we ask that you give the caretaker 30 minutes to respond to your message or page. If it is some other non-emergency situation, we ask that you give the caretaker 6-8 hours to respond.

Safe Transport of Visitors

It is the responsibility of all groups visiting the camp to ensure safe ingress and egress of the individuals with their group. The maps in this safety plan can be used to assist with this.

Safe and Orderly Environment

All users of Camp Latieze should be respectful of the facilities, camp grounds and nature areas. It is the responsibility of all groups visiting the camp to make sure that this respect is maintained. When the camp is used for education purposes, special care must be used to ensure a safe and orderly environment conducive to learning. Camp Latieze currently has no history of criminal behavior, student or otherwise. It is our intention that our record in that area remains unblemished. If any user of the camp notices criminal behavior, they must immediately bring that to the attention of the group leader. If it is a school-related function the group leader must ensure that they follow all the behavior policies of the sending school. This is to include suspension/expulsion, dangerous students, child abuse reporting, weapons/dangerous instruments, sexual harassment, dress codes, and discipline. Camp staff follows all board policies when it addresses the matters shown above.

Observation Blind/Dock

There is an observation blind located on the north side of the pond and a small dock on the west end of the pond. These facilities are available to groups wishing to view the variety of wildlife near the pond area. These are not recreation facilities and should not be used as such. Swimming is not allowed in the pond. Groups are welcome to visit the pond and meadow area, as well as use the observation facilities, after informing the camp coordinator of their intentions. Please make sure that members of your group observe and adhere to the number of persons and limitations noted near these observation facilities.

Intruder on Grounds

If an unauthorized person is noticed on the grounds, the group leader and camp caretaker should immediately be notified. If the situation appears safe, the unauthorized individual should be approached and asked to leave the camp. If the situation does not appear safe or if the unauthorized person refuses to leave, the group leader or camp caretaker should call 911 for assistance. In any event, keep all other camp visitors away from the unauthorized person.

Wildlife

All visitors to the camp should be aware that the camp and its surrounding areas are habitat to many different wildlife species. It is possible that the interaction of humans and wildlife could be potentially hazardous to both the humans and the wild animals. Below are several potentially dangerous animals and action to be taken to avoid a harmful encounter.

Mountain Lion¹

- Avoid hiking alone
- Make noise while hiking,
- Keep small children close while hiking, at arms reach in areas that may conceal a mountain lion
- Hike with a good walking stick
- Do not approach a mountain lion
- Do NOT run, stay and face the lion
- Try to appear large by raising your arms; raise your backpack if you have one

- Pick up small children without crouching. This will make you appear larger and prevent the child from running
- Fight back if attacked. Try to remain standing and face the animal. Use branches, rocks and your bare hands

Black Bear²

- Do not feed a bear.
- Do not approach a bear
- Do not run from a bear. This will encourage a chase; the bear is faster than you.
- If the bear approaches you- stand and face it, appear larger by raising your arms, your backpack or opening your jacket.
- Yell and bang objects, create a commotion

Rattlesnake³

- Stay on well-used, open trails
- Avoid walking through thick brush and willow thickets
- Do not step or put your hands where you cannot see
- Wear over the ankle boots and loose fitting long pants
- Be wary of the telltale rattle
- If you do encounter a rattlesnake, back away from it
- If an encounter should occur with any of these animals within a close proximity to the actual campgrounds it should be reported. The number for this is on page 2 of this safety plan.

Hazardous/Poisonous Plants

Many types of plants are edible; however, some can be quite dangerous. The general rule is to avoid ingesting any plant or tree parts while visiting Camp Latieze. Exceptions should only be made if a member of your group is experienced in those matters and they wish to do a demonstration. Please make sure that your campers are especially warned against eating any mushrooms or acorns.

Poison Oak⁴

Almost everyone whose skin brushes up against these plants may experience an allergic reaction consisting of redness, small bumps and intense itching. In severe cases, large blisters may develop and the rash may cover substantial areas of skin. Mild cases can be managed with cool compresses and calamine lotion (both of which can be found in our first aid supplies. In more severe cases (see below), a doctor should be consulted.

Is Medical Attention Necessary?

Only if large blisters develop over extensive areas or if the rash is near the eyes. A rash that starts out resembling poison oak but spreads over most of the body or fails to improve after a week or so also should be checked out by a doctor. In addition, medical attention is necessary if a baby under one year of age gets a rash that resembles poison oak. Prevention Have camp attendees wear long pants and sleeves when they walk in wooded areas with thick underbrush. Remove clothing that has touched poison oak and immediately wash it in hot water.

Identifying Poison Oak

SPRING – leaves are light, bright green with whitish-green flowers clustered on the stems.

SUMMER – yellow-green, pink or reddish colors to some of the leaves with small white or tan berries following the flowers

FALL – fruit becomes darker, dried and wrinkled, and leaves turn bright red or russet brown.

WINTER – leaves and seeds fall, leaving stick or whip-like stems or climbing vines.

Power Failure

If there is a power failure, the group leader should try to establish when the electricity will be returned by contacting PG&E. They should then notify the other camp visitors of the estimated time. If it is determined that the power failure will last for an unusual length of time, they will need to determine if the group's visit to the camp should be discontinued. Without power, the cooking facilities in the kitchen would not work; however, there is a gas stove available in the staff cabin. The only source of heat available would be the fireplace in the main hall. The water pump would not work, so there would be a limited amount of water in the pressure tank.

Emergency Procedures

Major Forest Fire

If a forest fire is noticed the group leader should immediately call 911 and conduct an emergency assembly. With the assistance of the 911 operator and the Shasta County Sheriff's Emergency Services Office, determine an appropriate course of action. Possible instructions you might receive include,

1. The fire is not near enough for concern. Continue your normal activities.
2. The fire is not near enough for immediate concern. Keep group assembled awaiting further notice.
3. The fire is near enough for a potential concern. Evacuate entire group by vehicle, using the road by which you arrived. Make sure that you have done a complete role call prior to departing and that your group stays together. The PIC should keep the caravan together until they can notify the authorities of their progress and safety.

4. The fire is near enough for an immediate concern and the authorities have determined that an emergency foot evacuation is necessary. Please follow the evacuation map in this safety plan and follow the path designated with the emergency evacuation reflective trail markers.

IMPORTANT NOTE: Only under the most extreme emergencies should a foot evacuation be attempted. The Shasta County Sheriffs Emergency Services Department should always coordinate a foot evacuation.

Should 911 be unavailable in the event of a forest fire, any of the following agencies may be contacted for instructions.

If a fire is near and the person in charge is not able to contact the authorities by phone they should use their own best judgment. A ground vehicle evacuation should always be the first alternative, staying assembled on site awaiting instruction is the second alternative and a foot evacuation is the very last alternative. Additional consideration in the event of a major forest fire:

- The creek and the pond could provide emergency shelter from the heat and flames.
- Manton School District has agreed to assist should an evacuation become necessary and there are not enough vehicles on site to transport all campers. They can be reached at 474-3167. If you are unable to reach the District office, please contact the bus drivers directly, Richard Smith at 474-3435 or Dave Turner at 474-3010.
- Unless otherwise instructed, driving evacuations should gather at the corner of Rock Creek Road and Forward Road in the town of Manton (see map page 16). Walking Evacuations should gather where the Latieze property trail emerges onto Rock Creek Road (see map page 18). After arrival at either of these locations, await further instructions from the authorities.

Building Fire

Immediately upon noticing a building fire, call 911 before starting any fire extinguishing procedures. If it appears that extinguishing the fire may be difficult (too large and/or spreading quickly) immediately evacuate camp after calling 911.

****DO NOT ATTEMPT TO EXTINGUISH FIRE IN THIS CASE****

After calling 911, please have a camp member contact the Camp Caretaker. He can be reached by calling 474-321 1. If you are unable to contact the caretaker, please call the Shasta County Office of Education at 225-0200.

If it appears that the fire might easily be controlled, please use fire extinguishers as your first recourse. If it is apparent that our water pump would be more advantageous, please

do so. The pump and the instructions are inside of the wooden pump box located between the pool area restrooms. Extra hose lengths are located in the hose box on the main camp walkway.

Medical Emergency

The group leader should be notified when there is a sick or injured individual. If it is a medical emergency, immediately call 911. Administer first aid as appropriate. In cases of severe injury, such as back or neck injury, electric shock or near drowning, the victim should not be moved. Depending upon the assessment of the injury, transporting the individual may be made by ground vehicle or helicopter (coordinates are on page 6).

Severe Storms

The mountain areas are known for their remarkable storms. During severe storms (high wind, lightning, etc.), all camp visitors should immediately return to camp and stay indoors. Care should be taken to avoid falling objects and broken glass caused by falling objects. During an electrical storm, stay out of and away from water (including the pool, puddles and showers). Avoid holding metal objects, operating telephones and other electrical electronic devices. Additionally, if you are outside during an electrical storm and unable to return to camp, crouch down, holding your knees while keeping your feet on the ground. Do not seek shelter under a tree.

Missing Person

In the event that an individual is thought to be missing, the group leader should be immediately notified. An emergency assembly should be conducted and a roll call performed. Find out where and when the individual was last seen. Conduct a preliminary search, taking care that no one else becomes missing. Call 911 to assist in the search.

Earthquake

If inside during an earthquake, take cover under a table or bunk. If outside, stay away from buildings and power lines. In ALL cases, do not run, do drop to your knees and cover your head with your arms. Take special care to avoid glass and other falling objects.

Once the earthquake has stopped, the group leader should perform an emergency assembly. If fire, injuries or missing persons occur, instructions for those areas in this safety plan should be consulted. Call 911 if road problems cause the need for a walking evacuation. Remember to consider aftershocks before performing a walking evacuation.

Bomb Threat

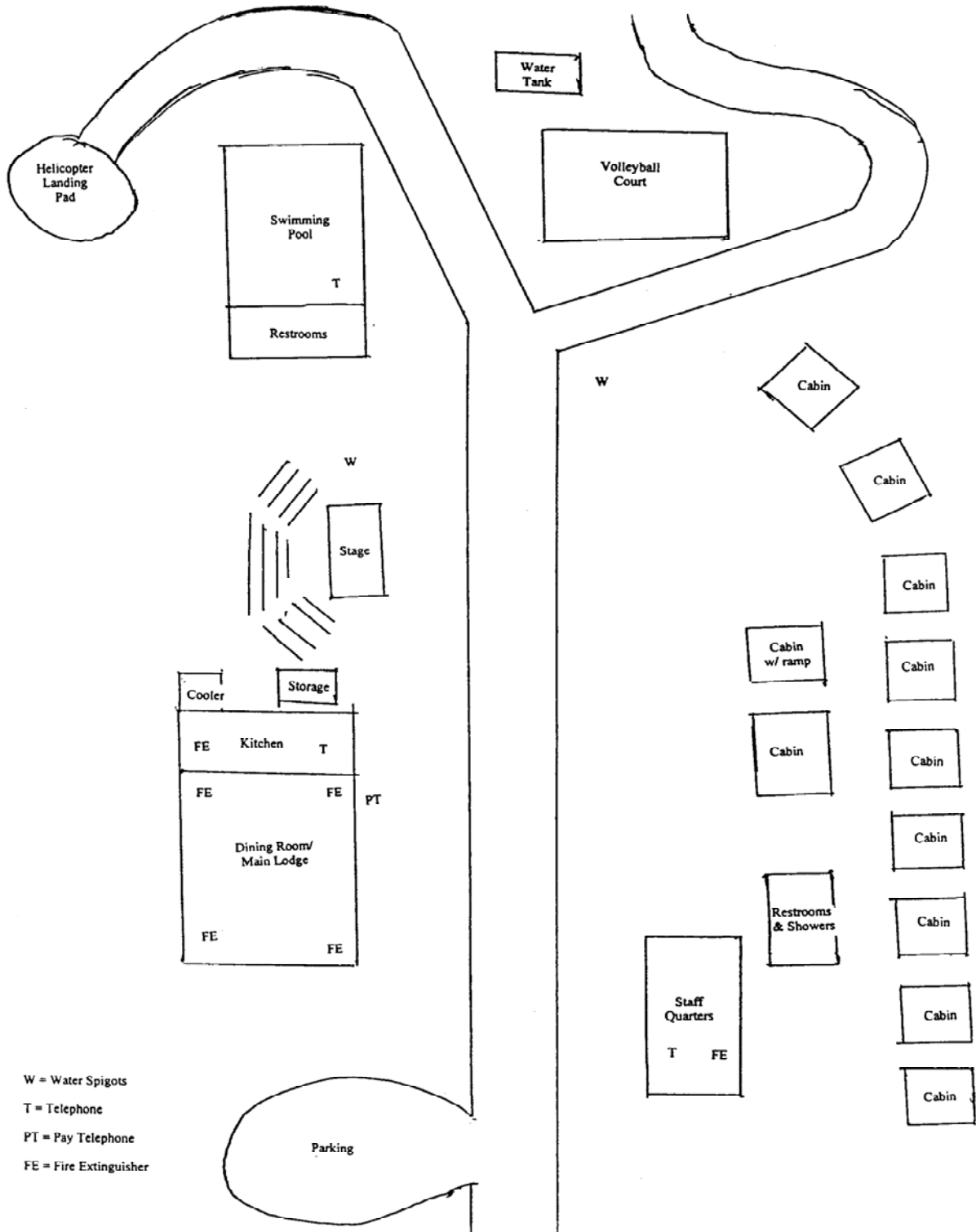
Immediately notify the group leader and the camp caretaker if a bomb threat is received, or if a suspicious object is noticed. The group leader should immediately call 911 and follow their instructions. In any event, an emergency assembly should be conducted in the event an evacuation is necessary.

Walking Evacuation Route

Follow the reflective route markers. The next marker will always be in eyesight. The markers lead south out of the camp area, over the creek, west (staying right) of the meadow and pond. There you will find a path to follow that will continue to lead south to Rock Creek Road. There is a clearing where the path meets Rock Creek Road which will be the meeting area for a group's retrieval after evacuation.

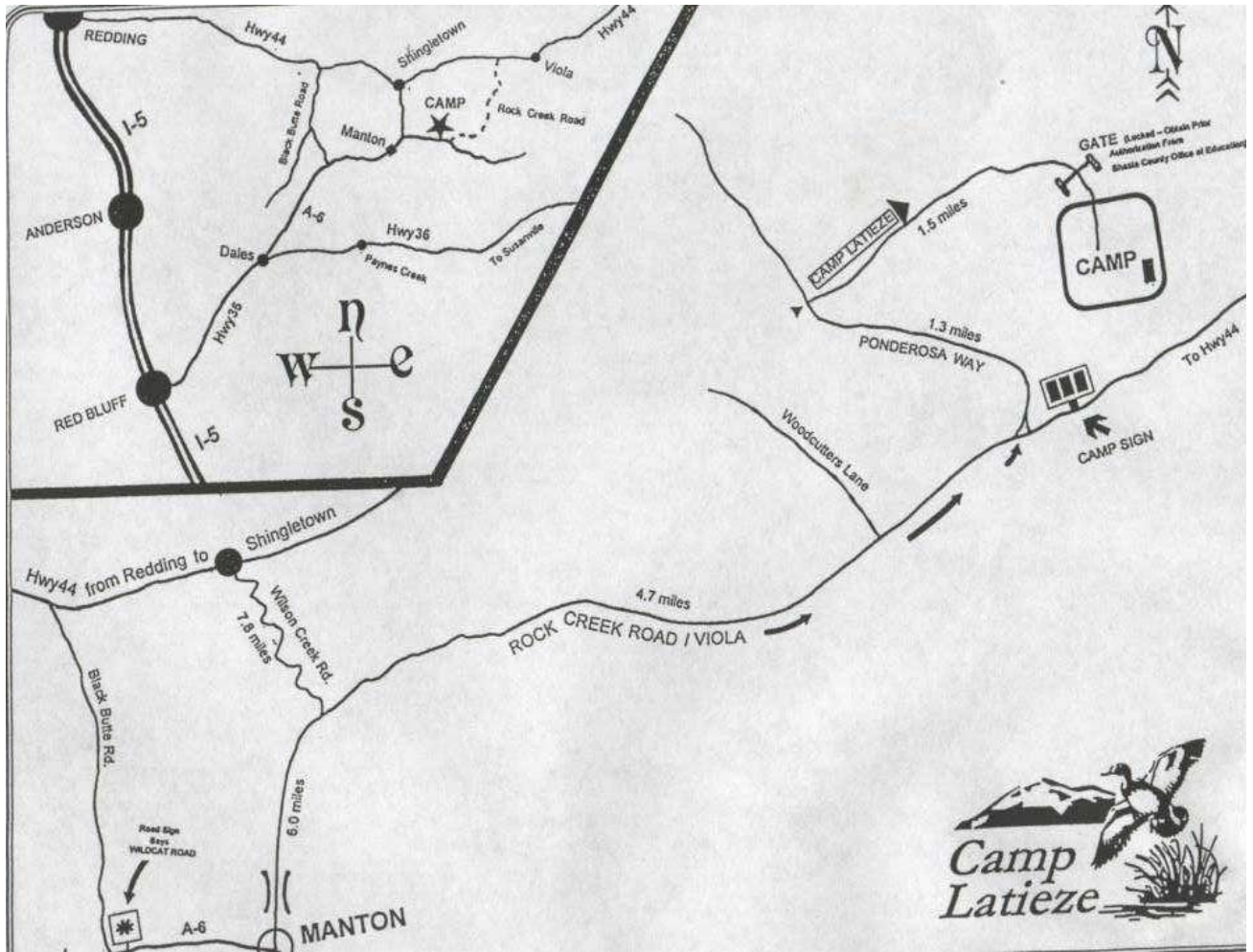
Please Remember- **NEVER EVACUATE THE CAMP AREA UNLESS INSTRUCTED BY A PERSON OF AUTHORITY.** It is much easier for a group to be rescued from a specified area than to be found on an evacuation route.

From Redding

There are two main routes to Camp Latieze from Redding. Both ways have sections that are very steep and quite narrow.

Option 1- (shorter but very steep and narrow)

Go east on Hwy. 44 toward Shingletown, turn right at the Shingletown Library (Wilson Hill Road, map shows Wilson Creek Road- the map is incorrect). Turn left at first stop sign, Rock Creek Road. Continue on Rock Creek Road approximately 3.4 miles, on your left you will see a sign for "Camp Latieze", turn left there onto Ponderosa Way (it is a dirt road). Stay on this dirt road for about 1.3 miles. You will reach another sign for "Camp Latieze" on the right. Follow this road another mile until you reach Camp.

Option 2- (longer but slightly less steep and narrow)

Go east on Hwy. 44 toward Shingletown, turn right at Black Butte Road. Continue on Black Butte Road, when you reach County Road A-6 (Manton Road) turn left, following signs to Manton. Go through the town of Manton. Turn left at the sign that reads "Shingletown/Forward Road" (There is a small store on the left corner). As you turn left, you will cross a narrow bridge. When you reach the sign "Shingletown/Viola" continue straight toward Viola. From that intersection, follow Rock Creek Road approximately 3.4 miles, on your left you will see a sign for "Camp Latieze", turn left there onto Ponderosa Way (it is a dirt road). Stay on this dirt road for about 1.3 miles. You will reach another sign for "Camp Latieze" on the right. Follow this road another mile until you reach Camp.

From Red Bluff

Take Hwy. 36 from Red Bluff toward Susanville. At Dales Corner take County Road A-6 (Manton Road) to Manton. Go through the town of Manton. Turn left at the sign that reads "Shingletown/Forward Road" (There is a small store on the left corner). As you turn left, you will cross a narrow bridge. When you reach the sign "Shingletown/Viola", continue straight toward Viola. From that intersection, follow Rock Creek Road approximately 3.4 miles, on your left you will see a sign for "Camp Latieze", turn left there onto Ponderosa Way (it is a dirt road). Stay on this dirt road for about 1.3 miles. You will reach another sign for "Camp Latieze" on the right. Follow this road another mile until you reach Camp.

Important: The final road into Camp Latieze has a locked gate. Please make arrangements to gain access prior to your arrival.

Safety Plan Agreement

As the leader for your group while visiting Camp Latieze, it is your responsibility to ensure the safety of your participants. This Safety Plan was written as a guide to help you with that responsibility. The Safety Plan should act as a guide and should not restrict the use of good judgment when handling situations as they arise.

The group leader will do the following in order to meet the terms of our Use Agreement:

1. Ensure a person in charge is on site at all times (see "Person in Charge" page 5).
2. Conduct an orientation regarding the details of this safety plan with all attendees to the camp either prior to or immediately following the group's arrival at the camp.
3. Ensure a health supervisor is on site at all times (see "Health Supervision" page 5).
4. Ensure a health history is on file at camp for all non-adult campers (see "Health Supervision" page 5).
5. Ensure that all illnesses and injuries are logged in the camp's medical logbook (see "Health Supervision" page 5).
6. Ensure that all food borne illnesses and medically diagnosed infectious, contagious or communicable diseases are reported to the Shasta County Department of Public Health (see "Health Supervision" page 5).
7. Ensure that all medication is properly maintained (see "Health Supervision" page 5).
8. Ensure counselors are on site as required (see "General Supervision" page 6).
9. Ensure that emergency transport, lifeguard, and food service staff are available as necessary (see "General Supervision" page 6).
10. Perform an emergency assembly within two hours of the group's arrival at the camp (see "Emergency Assembly" page 6).
